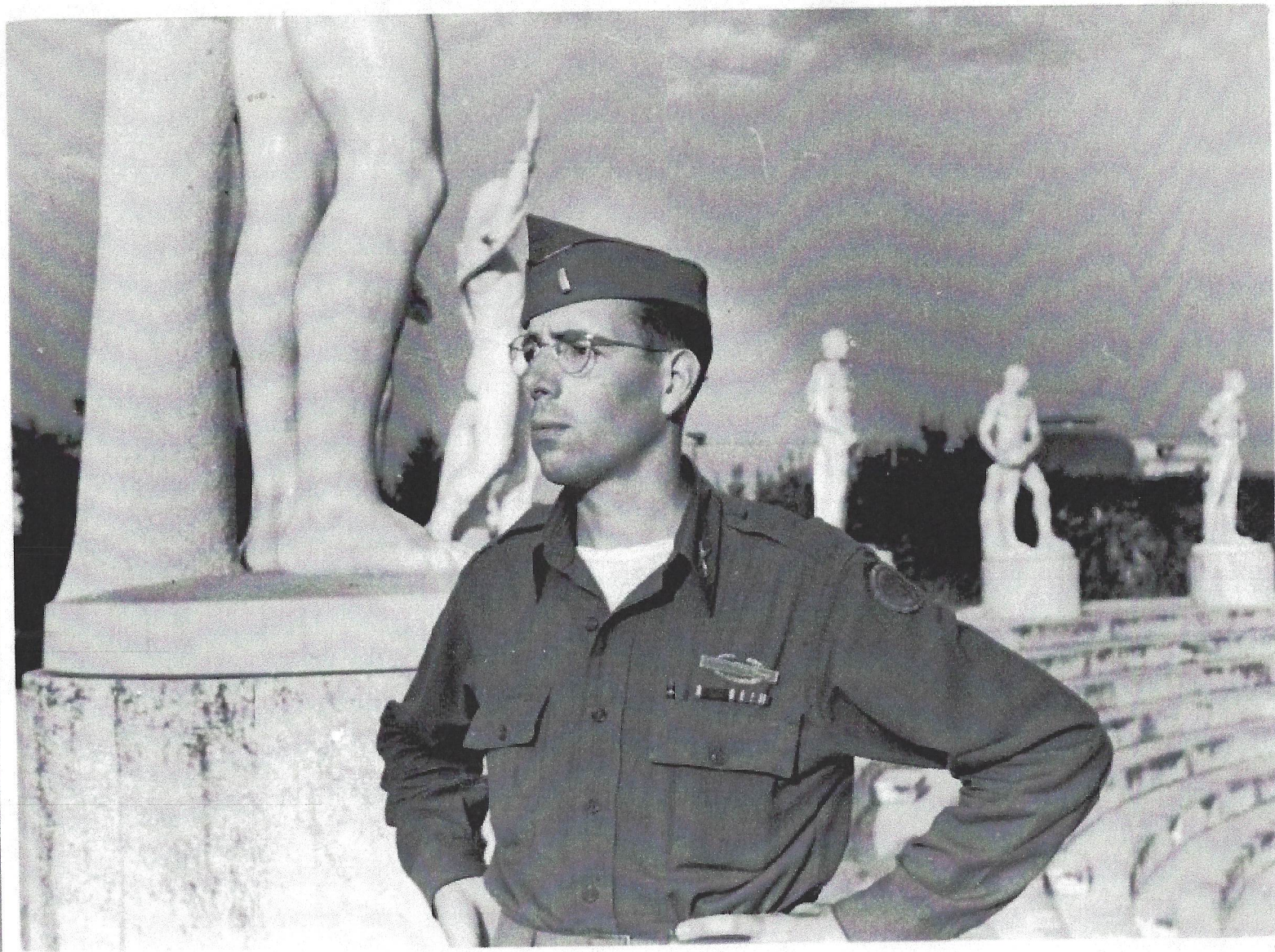

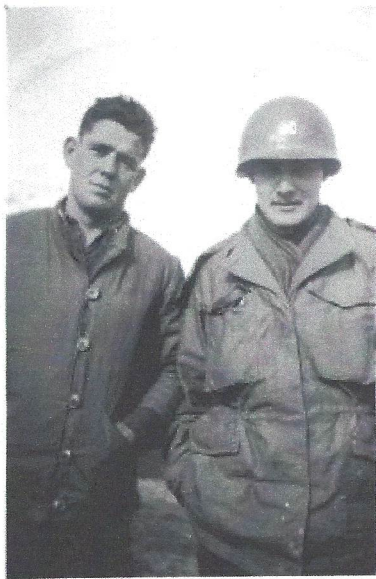

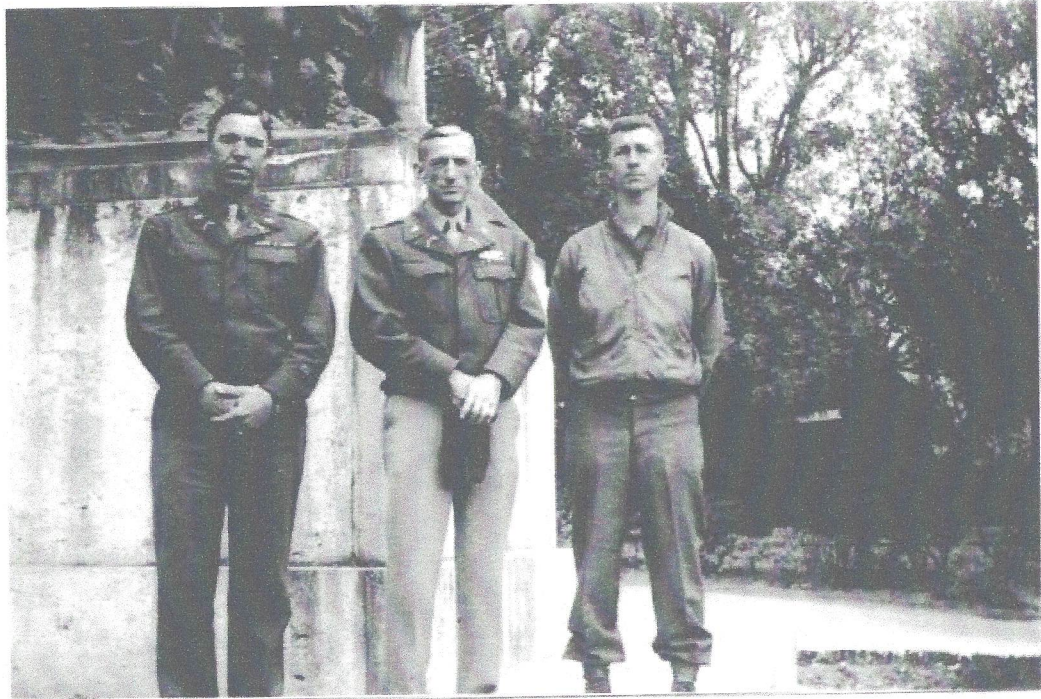

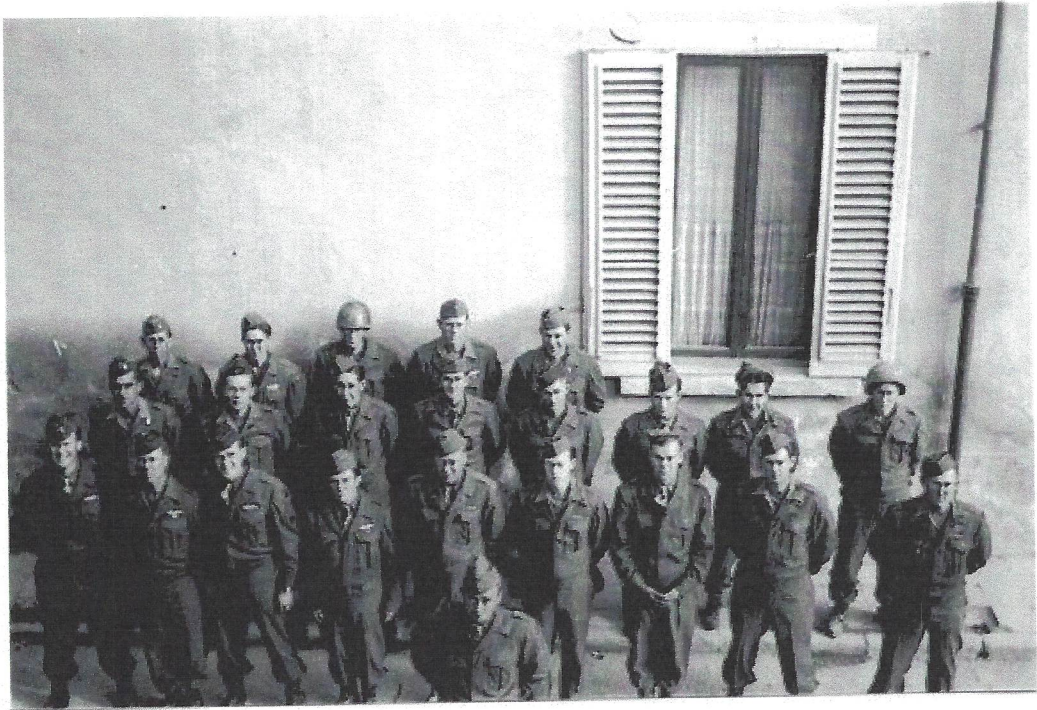

north of Florence, Italy, February 1945

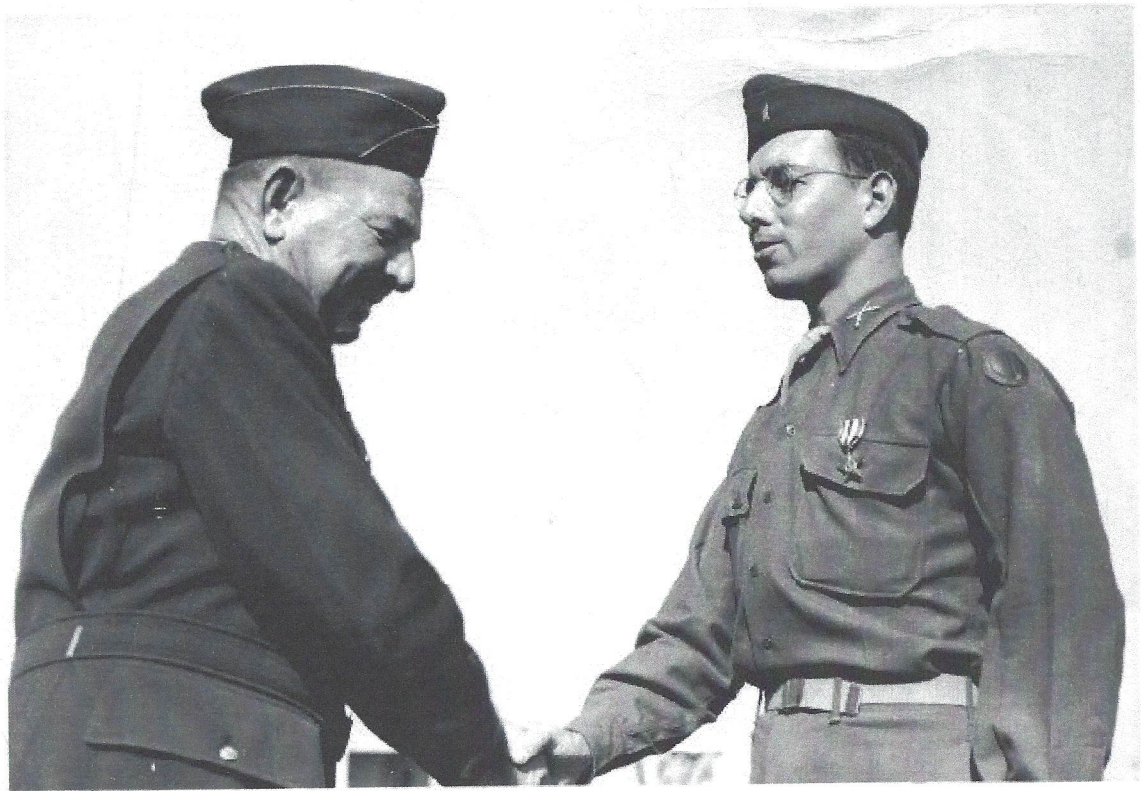

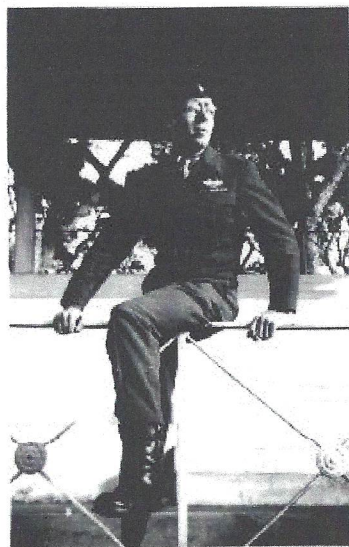

Receiving the Silver Star Medal

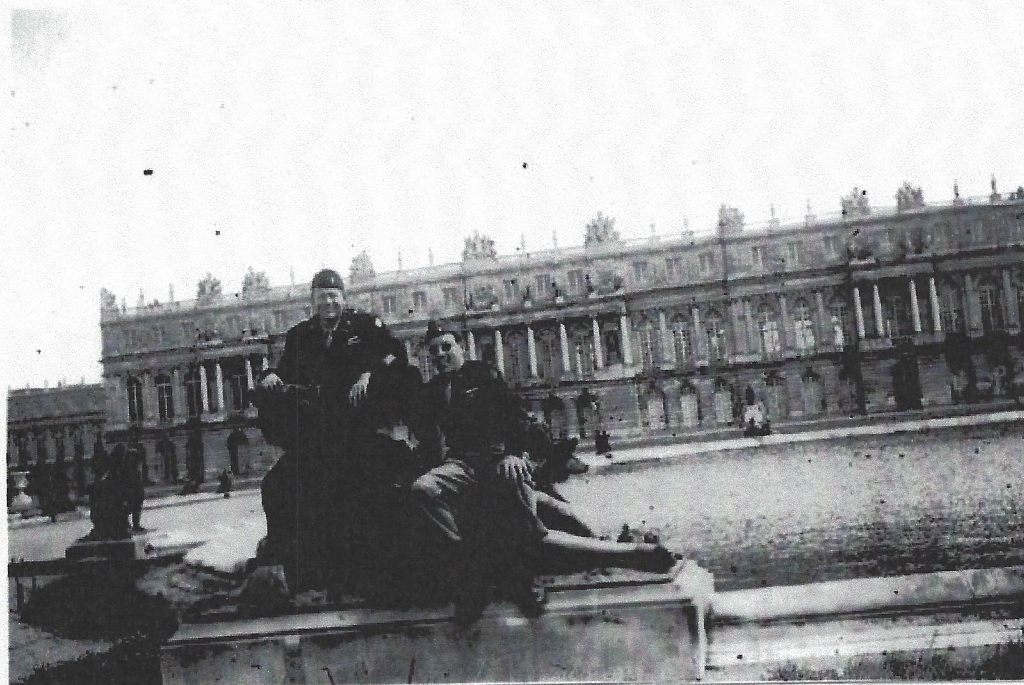


Near Pisa, Italy, March 1945
